Below is a beautiful flowering Little Blue Stem plant filled meadow. The seed eating bird Ito the right s a female Northern Flicker. I believe the bird's pink cheeks indicate its sex. This very common woodpecker spends most of its time on the ground eating ants and seeds. Interestingly she will also crush the some of the ants to extract formic acid to preen with. The chemical will kill any parasites that threaten her skin and feathers.
