The Winter Solstice just passed, this newsletter features Nature's preparation and celebration of new life. New birth is sacred in all of the natural world. I thank Buddy for this magnificent picture of a young, perhaps 4 or 5 year old Raptor beginning what appears to be a first nest. Both male and female Eagles were at work on this nest last week. Eagle nests generally are 4-5" wide and 2-4' deep. New nesting material is added annually.

Nest building will take only about a 7 days. The female will lay up to 2 eggs. Incubation will take 35 days. In 10-12 weeks the Eaglets can be fledged although in cold climates they may stay with their parents for 9 months or more. Eagles can live up to 30 years. It is believed that only 2.5 out of 20 survive to breeding age.

A female Eagle will be fertile all her life. Considering this she can launch as many as 40 progeny.
