Do You Recognize This Nest?

This time of the year when much of the thick foliage has left bare branches in trees its fun to scan deciduous trees to forecast which birds will be expected in the next weeks.

Please join Audubon today in using your downloaded Merlin Bird ID program to identify the birds in your neighborhood. Today is the final day of their **February World Wide Bird** count.

Interestingly my Sun City, Arizona ecosystem is currently welcoming a huge migration of song birds as well as a few "accidental" arrivals. Pink colored listed birds are recent arrivals

Of course the above is an Oriole's Nest. According to Audubon, experts aren't sure why birds have adapted to build hanging nests.'The most obvious benefit is that the deep cups and narrow entranceways-two to three inches wide- provide better protection from predators and brood parasites. Baltimore, Orchard, Scott's and Hooded Orioles all build hanging nests.

It is believed that an oriole's ability to create the architectural wonders is driven by instinct says Audubon. Over time birds have become increasingly adept at weaving hanging structures. Orioles use the materials at hand...even fishing line!
