The California Condor became extinct in the wild in 1987 when all remaining wild individuals were captured. The breed was successfully revived and 6 pair were reestablished in the rugged mountain/Glen Canyon area at the Arizona Utah border. As of 2024 85 Condors were successfully breeding there. The Butler's watched three of them quietly rustling about. Research suggests that these vultures do not build nests. Instead they incubate their young in mud structures often times on the ground of mountainsides. California Condors are extremely rare.
